9. Description *

WYAS is carrying out a ground-breaking project to transcribe the diaries of Anne Lister of Shibden Hall, 1806-1840, often known as the 'first modern lesbian', and the inspiration for the BBC/HBO drama 'Gentleman Jack'.

Anne's diaries, which consist of around 5 million words, cover all aspects of her life in intimate detail; her relationships with women, her business dealings, politics, estate management, education, and her personal health and wellbeing. She also records local and national events; such as attending society soirees, her thoughts on the Peterloo Massacre, and meeting Royalty on her extensive European travels. Anne's diaries were inscribed in UNESCO's UK Memory of the World Register in recognition of their substantial cultural significance. However, the true extent of Anne's diaries remains hidden in her abbreviation filled handwriting and her coded 'crypt-hand'.

Our aim is to make Anne's diaries increasingly accessible and extend their world-wide impact by making complete transcripts available on our online catalogue. To achieve this we are asking volunteers to help transcribe Anne's diaries. There are currently over 140 volunteer 'Code Breakers' globally with an active social media community sharing advice on transcribing, stories from the diaries, and their own personal and emotional interactions with Anne Lister.

10. Target audience

The project is open to anyone and is designed to be carried out by volunteers working remotely. A digitisation project has allowed digital images of Anne's diaries to be made available on the WYAS online catalogue since April 2019, ahead of the transcription project commencing in July 2019. This has opened up the project from local volunteers able to visit our search room to volunteers from anywhere around the World.

The diaries of Anne Lister have a particular interest for the LGBTQ+ community and for women. Anne's diaries were inscribed in the UNESCO UK Memory of the World Register in recognition of their substantial cultural significance, in particular their importance in the field of Gender Studies and Women's History.

The BBC/HBO drama 'Gentleman Jack', by BATFA award winner Sally Wainwright, increased awareness of Anne and her diaries. WYAS was able to develop links with these audiences using social media prior to starting this project helping to ensure an increased project audience.

The Covid-19 pandemic has changed and developed this audience. The project has allowed our audience to volunteer on a project while being restricted to their own homes and to interact with other volunteer 'Code Breakers' on social media.

11. Aim *

Who was the project for and why did they need this?

The project aims to create complete transcriptions of Anne Lister's diaries. These transcripts will be made freely available on our online catalogue. The project will increase accessibility, engage an enthusiastic audience of Anne Lister fans, and extend the impact of Anne's diaries to a world-wide audience.

In her diaries Anne records her relationships with women, homosexuality in early 19th century society, and how her religious beliefs and sexuality fit together. She records how she ran her estate and business in a man's world, learning coal mining and estate management rather than allowing others to undertake this work.

Anne's diaries also provide a wealth of information about politics, business, religion, education, science, travel, local and national events, medicine and health. Anne's diaries have the potential to be a significant resource for a wide range of researchers on a huge number of topics.

The project is of particular significance for gay women. Anne has become an important historical figure within the LGBTQ+ community whose stories are often absent from the historical record. The project allows individuals to learn more about Anne and interact with her story on an emotional level. It allows us to engage with this community both locally and internationally

12. Process *

The subject of the diaries, Anne Lister, and the extent of the diaries themselves make the project unique.

The project has been undertaken in a way which engages as wide an audience as possible. The complexity of Anne's handwriting, and her coded 'crypt-hand', means that volunteers are massively important to the project, with volunteers developing the extensive skills needed to transcribe Anne's diaries.

Online access to the diaries allows us to offer a broader volunteering programme than ever before. There are no geographical limits and great flexibility on the time volunteers can commit to the project.

The assignment of pages to volunteers is managed by Archive staff with each page assigned to two volunteers to help ensure the accuracy of the final transcripts.

The project was launched to capitalise on the surge in interest created by the 'Gentleman Jack' drama. The project webpage was created to promote the project, seek volunteers and explain how to get involved, including a test transcription page. This was further developed through our social media channels using our project hashtag #AnneListerCodeBreaker. A huge level of interaction and support has been developed, between the volunteers and the Archive Service, and amongst the social media community.

13. Number of participants in the project or visitors to date *

The project has so far engaged over 140 volunteer 'Code Breakers' in transcribing the diaries of Anne Lister.

Volunteers are located around the World, including across Europe (United Kingdom, Belgium, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Italy, Netherlands, Norway, Portugal, Republic of Ireland, Russia, Spain, Sweden), North America (Canada and USA), and Australia.

As well as over 140 individuals (and couples) who have engaged as volunteer 'Code Breakers', the project has engaged a lecture group based at a College in Virginia, USA. The College lecturer used the project to set a transcription assignment for the LGBTQ+ history and literature classes with the students providing transcripts to the project.

WYAS created a Twitter hashtag (#AnneListerCodeBreaker) to allow the creation of an active social media community where the volunteer 'Code Breakers' can share advice on transcribing, stories from the diaries, and their own personal and emotional interactions with Anne Lister and engage a wider audience of potential Anne Lister researchers and volunteers.

The transcription project webpages have received 24,000 views since July 2019 as part of 126,000 views of our online Anne Lister exhibition since its launch in April 2019 (https://wyascatablogue.wordpress.com/exhibitions/anne-lister/).

14. Impact and outcome of the project *

Outcomes tell us effect of our outputs on people. Impact tells us effect of our outputs and outcomes on organisations and/or society in general.

It is hard to overstate the impact that Anne Lister's diaries are having on a significantly underrepresented and under-documented section of society, namely gay women. The massive uptake in a 'transcription project' helps to highlight this and has arguably never been seen before.

The project is engaging many woman who have never used archives before. They are now our most engaged and enthusiastic users – in the work they are carrying out and the stories they are sharing with others, both of Anne's life and how this reflects their own lives.

Living as gay women, often means living in difficult situations, hiding their sexuality, dealing with discrimination, and have often been underrepresented or negatively portrayed in media and culture. Anne's diaries are of huge importance in correcting this bias.

The project is making the diaries globally accessible, allowing us to engage a larger and more diverse group of volunteers than ever before. The project, using the collective ability of our volunteers, is bringing the diaries to life and into view for those people who need them most.

As an organisation, the project has enabled us to realise our capabilities to run a large volunteer project and opened up opportunities to develop similar projects.

15. Evaluation *

Is there anything that didn't go as expected, or that you could have avoided? Is there anything that helped you achieve your goal? What evidence do you have from your evaluation of beneficial impact? Will the project be continued or rolled out? Has it led to recognition or further opportunities?

The way people have interacted with Anne Lister has been remarkable. Many have felt a strong personal connection to Anne's story and been emotionally moved by gaining access to her diaries.

The level of interest has been much higher than expected. The number of volunteers has allowed us to progress more quickly than anticipated, undertaking work that we would not be able to undertake without them. This has meant increased pressure on Archive staff to fulfil the enthusiasm for more pages to transcribe, however, this is a fantastic challenge to have. Progress updates are included on the project webpage. We are now starting to create finalised transcripts, with the first to be available online soon.

The project webpages and social media have been central to the project, allowing us to publicise the project, share information and a test transcription for potential volunteers, handle the level of interest, and facilitated the volunteers in forming a strong online community.

The project was chosen as a case study for 'A Year in Archives 2019' (TNA) to demonstrate how "Archives enhance and enrich our society intellectually, culturally and economically"

16. Tips *

For example, how things could have been done differently

Social media is an important tool, allowing improved contact with volunteers, allowing volunteers to contact each other and create a project community. It also allows others to follow the project and makes it open and accessible for a wider audience. #AnneListerCodeBreaker was created to allow an area of the project to be controlled by the volunteers. For such an important subject the story of Anne must be allowed to grow naturally, while Archive staff manage the project and focus the work and enthusiasm of the volunteers.

The project management ensures a systematic approach to a large transcription project. This focusses the combined power and abilities of volunteers to transcribe the 5 million words rather than disparate sections. This has been an important aspect of such a large project and will influence future projects.

Clear transcription guidelines are needed from the outset. These were published on the project webpages, however, as the project proceeds some alterations or refinements may be needed.

Handwriting recognition programmes may be suitable for other transcription projects, with simpler handwriting. However, this would not gain the same level of engagement as a volunteer project, through which your volunteers can become important ambassadors and advocates for your service.

17. Future Developments *

How will this work be developed in the future?

The project will continue to provide opportunities for volunteer involvement transcribing Anne Lister's diaries. As the project progresses we will look to create further volunteer opportunities in the next phase of the project, helping to check and create final edited transcripts.

WYAS is planning an exhibition to show Anne Lister 'in her words' based on the transcriptions produced by this project. We intend to engage the volunteer 'Code Breakers' with the exhibition to explore their personal connections with Anne, how the project has impacted them personally, and provide insights into the qualitative impact, particularly in terms of wellbeing, mental health, community cohesion and diversity.

As a result of this project WYAS will look at carrying out similar projects using its collections. A project to transcribe the diaries of Lady Amabel Yorke has already commenced from our Leeds office. The feedback from the volunteer 'Code Breakers' will be used to shape these future projects.

We have had a number of other organisations in the archives sector seeking advice on how the project was set up. We will continue to share the project as an example for the archives sector, including our experiences and learning developed by undertaking the project.
