Summary of ARA equality monitoring findings for 2013

General trends:

- Results are broadly stable, with little change between 2012 and 2013
- Women outnumber men among the membership by more than two to one
- Very few ARA members are Black, Asian or Mixed-race
- In other respects, there is considerable amount of diversity among ARA members, particularly in regard to disability, but absolute numbers are very small

Response rate:

32.7% – slightly up from 2012's figure of 28.7%.

Age:

- Generally stable, with the notable exception of the under 25s
- 2.5% from the under 25 age group up from 0% in 2012
- 10.5% from the 65 or over age group up from 9%. There is no obvious correlation between respondents above normal retirement age and those reporting disabilities or long-term health conditions

Gender:

Stable at approximately 70% female

Sexual orientation:

- Generally stable across all categories
- 82% heterosexual
- 6% lesbian, gay, bisexual or asexual
- 12% prefer not to say or no answer

Religion:

- Broadly stable across most categories
- 49.5% Christian down from 53.5%
- 40.5% no religion up from 37%
- 8% prefer not to say or no answer

 Very small numbers of other religions; no respondents specified Hinduism or Sikhism in either 2012 or 2013

Ethnic group:

- Broadly stable across most categories
- It is difficult to assess the results because many respondents wished to specify their ethnicity in more detail than the categories offered. (Note: our categories were those used in the 2011 census for England and Wales)
 Some respondents reported a nationality (e.g. Canadian) but not an ethnicity
- 79.5% White British down slightly from 81%
- 4.5% White Irish the largest 'minority' group. Bear in mind, however, that our membership covers the whole island of Ireland as well as Great Britain
- 9.5% prefer not to say or no answer up from 7%
- Most respondents who specified a minority group were White (but neither British nor Irish). Fewer than 1% reported themselves as Black or Asian

Disabilities and long-term health conditions:

- Broadly stable across most categories
- 68.5% no disability down slightly from 70%
- 12.5% one or more disabilities/health conditions down slightly from 13.5%.
 (Note: Some respondents specified more than one disability, so the detailed figures add up to more than 100%)
- 19% prefer not to say or no answer up from 17%
- Proportions of respondents reporting the more common types of disabilities remain roughly stable (mobility 3%, hearing 3%, visual 1.5%, mental health 2.5%); a very broad range of other disabilities and long-term health conditions were reported in very small numbers
- 0% intellectual disability.
